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The Roots of Northwest

In January 2001 Cam Loewen (NBS Alumnus) moved from Fort McMurray to Calgary to take up the pastorate at Westbourne Baptist Church. Cam has also served on the Northwest Board of Governors for 4 years as the FEBCAST representative.

Seventy-two years ago Morley Hall, following God's leading, arrived with a passion and vision for ministry in Calgary. The Lord richly blessed his ministry at Westbourne Baptist Church in the planting of several churches. In 1934 Westbourne Baptist Church founded the Western Baptist Bible College which became Northwest Baptist Theological College when it

reopened in Port Coquitlam, B.C. after World War II. Westbourne and Northwest have been connected since the very first day and it is a privilege for me to be a part of their continuing history. Morley Hall, the pastor of Westbourne in the 1930's, was a man deeply committed to church planting – a number of churches were planted as a result of his radio ministry. Dr. Hall also had a vision for the training of pastors and leaders for those churches. It was to meet those needs that he founded Northwest so many years ago.

Our vision at Northwest remains much the same today – to provide effective pastors and leaders for our churches.

LP: What do you discern to be God's calling in your life? How did you come to realize this? Barton: My dad is a pastor and

so I grew up with an inside view of a pastor's family. In fact pastors have been part of our family for the past five generations. As I grew up, I discovered that I could

speak well and had confidence in relating to people. When I was 17 years old, God really got hold of me. He gave me a passion to see people saved and to help them grow as disciples of Jesus.

LP: What special challenges have you faced as you followed this calling and prepared yourself for it? How has God helped you overcome these challenges?

Barton: I find my own sinful nature my greatest challenge - the war within. I am so grateful for Jesus and his victory in my life. In my teen years I was dishonest in speech and a thief, shoplifting



from stores. When God got hold of me, He put in my heart a strong desire for personal integrity --- a harvest of righteousness. So I went back and made recompense to those from whom I had stolen and sought forgiveness from those I had deceived. I want my life to be above reproach as God's Spirit empowers me. The

Hebrews 12 principles on discipline and righteousness are huge in my life.

During the past four years I have worked as a resident director at Trinity Western University. This position has

helped me learn how to model discipleship, as well as preaching and teaching. These are key elements for a pastoral leader.

Northwest Baptist Seminary achieves gift funding target for 2001-2002

With the help and prayers of many friends, the support of our churches, and the diligent work of our staff and Board, God has helped us to meet our gift-funding target for this current fiscal year, ending April 30, 2002. We had established a goal of \$60,000. In addition, we set a target of \$5,000 in additional gifts for special financial aid and \$5,000 to help initiate the Northwest Centre for Fellowship Leadership Development (NCFLD).

As of April 30, 2002 I am pleased to report that God's people have given \$63,000 in gifts, \$6,800 towards financial aid, and \$5,000 towards NCFLD, for a total of \$74,800. We are thankful to God for His provision.

LP: What vision do you have for your role as pastor? What do you think will be the special opportunities for personal growth that God will bring your way?

Barton: My vision as a pastor includes:

- Discipling new believers
- Prompting minds to be engaged with God's
- Motivating hearts to be inflamed with a passion for God and people
- Fostering hands of servanthood to the church and to the world
- · All of this is anchored in the challenge of enhancing God's glory

vocation. There is no easy ride for church leaders, but we have this confidence that Jesus will build his church. I have confidence in God's sovereign role. There are people in the church who will pray for me and help me. I must get to know the people in my church - listening to how this particular church plays as an orchestra – and then find my place in how to lead. I need to win the hearts of the people so that I can truly provide spiritual leadership. Leadership without love and relationship is not leadership at all. Providing balance among the generations within the church and thus promoting the unity of the body of Christ will be a priority.

LP: How have the learning opportunities at Northwest@ACTS helped you in your preparation? Is there a particular incident that stands out in your mind as specifically important in your ministry development?

Barton: The leadership track of courses in the MA in Christian Studies was critical for me, along with the opportunity to apply biblical leadership principles in my role as resident director. I had the opportunity to sort out the relationship between leadership and theology what they have to do with each other. The older, more mature students in my courses were an incredible

LP: What advice or encouragement would you give to people who sense God's call into ministry, but are uncertain whether to respond?

Barton: Count the cost. You will need to use your mind. as well as being passionate for God and people. Study the Bible and serve God. Learn to know Christ and yourself in relationship to him.

Personally, I have found that God has provided for us along the way. God provided a job for me at Trinity that integrated so well with my calling and gave me many opportunities to discern gifting.

Understanding the nature of the Christian community and learning how to love the body of Christ is key. Experiential learning is empowering.

Search your heart and do things to the glory of God. He will insure that all other matters are looked after.

LP: Who have been your key mentors and supporters? How have they helped you?

Barton: I have mentors who are still alive and some who are part of church history. The writings of Charles Spurgeon, George Whitfield, Jonathan Edwards.

Martyn Lloyd-Jones and A.W. Tozer continue to challenge me spiritually. Then there is the tremendous encouragement of my wife and colleagues at Trinity. Dr. Barrie Palfreyman who passed

away a little over a year ago was a significant mentor for me.

In the case of my wife, Heather, she complements me so well. Our gifts work together. She knows she is called to be a pastor's wife. Her love for people is amaz-

LP: How can we best pray for you?

Barton: The greatest thing that I would pray for is the power of the Holy Spirit upon my ministry. I know that no true spiritual work is accomplished but by the sovereign might of God. Pray that I would strive to be a vessel that can be used. Pray that in my youthfulness I would be given wisdom and patience. Pray that Jesus would build his church at Dunbar Heights Baptist Church.

As we look back on this year, how have we done?

- We have trained and equipped together with our partners in ACTS seventy new ministry
- Two new graduate programs have started Chaplaincy and Contemporary Apologetics.
- Four hundred and fifty different people received training from Northwest@ACTS.
- Lay leadership training initiatives began in four Fellowship churches.
- The Theological Education Taskforce completed its work and submitted its final report giving us direction for the future.
- Three pastors/mentors' days brought many ministry leaders on campus for times of renewal and refreshment.
- Our new Youth Leadership Training Program is now ready for implementation.
- Two Contemporary Apologetics Seminars were held, as well as the Substance Abuse Conference, all of which helped church leaders understand more clearly the challenges of being Christian in a pluralistic society, the issues raised by Islam, and ways that our church communities can help those suffering from addictions.
- Northwest has provided over \$30,000 in financial aid.
- The Associated Canadian Theological Schools, our consortium of seminaries, received a very significant affirmation of quality as our accreditation was renewed for a ten year period.
- Dr. Archie Spencer joined our faculty in the area of theology.
- We are sponsoring our first Baptist Studies conference (May 3-4).
- The foundational planning and fund-raising for our new Northwest Centre for Fellowship Leadership Development has been completed.
- Financially, we will end the year with a balanced budget, no debts, and a solid financial base for future ministry initiatives.
- Our Board of Governors is transforming itself into a policy-governance Board, giving clearer direction to the President for the accomplishment of our mission.

This is a long list and does not include many other significant contributions made by faculty, staff and friends. But all of these things centre around our single passion - recruiting, training and sustaining a new generation of ministry leaders. We believe by God's grace that substantial progress has occurred this year. We have faith that God will enable us all to work collaboratively together - church leaders, Fellowship Ministry Centre leaders, Northwest faculty, our Board of Governors, our friends and supporters, and our students - to take an even bigger step forward in this coming year.
